## HEADQUARTERS NORTH UPDATE FROM COLONEL PETER STITT, COMMANDER NORTH



Since our establishment on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2024, Headquarters North has delivered significant progress across our responsibilities: resilience operations, societal engagement, cadet support, and improving military community life.

We certified as a Joint Military Command, leading Defence contributions to regional resilience efforts in the form of Military Aid to the Civil Authorities (MACA). This included supporting police with specialist capabilities, providing additional armed security at MOD sites, contributing to the Afghan resettlement programme, and

exercising contingency operations to support multi-agency partners.

We hosted Royal Gun Salutes and organised key visits to strengthen partner understanding of the Army, showcasing our junior soldier training at the Army Foundation College Harrogate and Ukrainian recruit training operations. We supported three Reserve Forces and Cadets Associations, helping employers recognise the value of service and cadet experience, and we backed the launch of three Regional Defence and Security Clusters to connect Defence with innovation and industry.

We have focused on improving the lived experience of the military community in the North, refining infrastructure management and aligning people-focused support under the Armed Forces Covenant.


These successes reflect the hard work of our team and the invaluable support from partners across Defence, resilience, government, education, and industry. Looking ahead, our focus is on four strategic priorities:

- Improve our Volunteer Estate Working with the Reserve Forces and Cadets Associations, we aim to improve facilities for our Reserves and Cadets, ensuring the estate supports recruitment, retention, and development.
- Expand Sport Engagement in the North Sport offers a powerful route
  to connect with society. We will deepen partnerships, especially with
  the Rugby Football League, and expand the Army Sports North
  programme. A regional facilities investment will include a new rugby
  centre of excellence at Catterick.
- Transform Catterick and York Garrisons We will support delivery of the £1.5Bn infrastructure investment to provide modern, high-quality accommodation for future generations of soldiers.
- Developing Resilience Operations We will continue to work with regional partners to provide MACA assistance, ultimately standing shoulder to shoulder when directed. We have specialist niche capabilities as well as the capacity to generate workforce at mass and often in a reduced timescale.



HQ North is home to 15,000 Regular soldiers, 15,000 Reservists and 15,000 cadets and adult volunteers.

**Cadet Force:** Cadets are aged 12 – 18 years and operate in community based (ACF) and schools based (CCF) units, led by volunteers the curriculum is a structured programme of life skills, including leadership, teamwork, STEM, and resilience whilst having fun, building friendships and experiencing adventure. Our return in investment to society are better educational outcomes, improved mental health, cadets are less likely to enter the justice system, better job prospects, building a future societal resilience in your community.



The University of Northampton studies show: Schools reported positive outcomes associated with the CCF contingent, with all schools, whether independent or in the state sector, noting that their CCF was an excellent way of reinforcing the values and standards of the school.
